

How do you think the world began?

The Big Bang Theory

Astronomers and scientists today believe that the universe began around 14 billion years ago when an extremely hot and dense bubble, even smaller than the head of a pin, exploded sending all the matter and energy contained in the bubble out in a huge blast. The universe started getting bigger and bigger with 10 billion degree protons, neutrons and other particles floating around space. Eventually, the temperature cooled enough for the particles to combine to create neutral atoms and matter.



The Big Bang theory was conceived when scientists, such as Edwin Hubble, noticed that other galaxies were moving further away meaning that the universe was expanding. This led them to believe that at some point in history there must have been a point when everything was closer together.

What the Big Bang theory does not explain is how or why the Big Bang happened and what the universe was like before this phenomenon began.



The Christian Creation Story

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. The earth was formless and empty, and darkness covered the deep waters. And the Spirit of God was hovering over the surface of

the waters.

Then God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. And God saw that the light was good. Then he separated the light from the darkness. God called the light "day" and the darkness "night."

And evening passed and morning came, marking the first day. Then God said. "Let there be a space between the waters, to separate the waters of the heavens from the waters of the earth." Then God said, "Let lights appear in the sky to separate the day from the night. Let them mark off the seasons, days, and years. Let these lights in the sky shine down on the earth." And that is what happened. God made two great lights—the larger one to govern the day, and the smaller one to govern the night. He also made the stars. God set these lights in the sky to light the earth, to govern the day and night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. And evening passed and morning came, marking the fourth day. Then God said, "Let the waters swarm with fish and other life. Let the skies be filled with birds of every kind." So God created great sea creatures and every living thing that scurries and swarms in the water, and every sort of bird—each producing offspring of the same kind. And God saw that it was good. Then God blessed them, saying, "Be fruitful and multiply. Let the fish fill the seas, and let the birds multiply on the earth."

And evening passed and morning came, marking the fifth day.

Then God said, "Let the earth produce every sort of animal, each producing offspring of the same kind—livestock, small animals that scurry along the ground, and wild animals." And that is what happened. God made all sorts of wild animals, livestock, and small animals, each able to produce offspring of the same kind. And God saw that it was good.

Then God said, "Let us make human beings in our image, to be like us.
They will reign over the fish in the sea, the birds in the sky, the
livestock, all the wild animals on the earth, and the small animals
that scurry along the ground."

So God created human beings in his own image.

In the image of God he created them;


male and female he created them.
