Dear Parent,

Your child is learning how vowels, (a, e, i, o, u) can make different sounds. For example 'oo' can have a short sound ('oo' as in wood) or a long sound ('oo' as in mood). All these words contain the short and long 'oo' sound. Please help by practising these words with your child. Thank you for your help.

- Point out the long and short 'oo' sounds and how they make the words rhyme.
- Try to think of other words that rhyme, follow the same rule or pattern.
- Discuss the meaning of the words and try to think of a sentence containing the word.
