Rome (<u>Italian</u> Roma) is the <u>capital city</u> of <u>Italy</u> and the Italian region <u>Latium</u>. It is on the <u>Tiber</u> River and has 2.8 million people. The estimated number of people of the city area of Rome is 3.47 million. The <u>enclave</u> <u>Vatican</u> City is in the north-west.

Geography

Location

Rome is in the Lazio region of central Italy on the Tiber river (Italian: Tevere).

Although the city centre is about 24 kilometres (15 mi) inland from the Tyrrhenian Sea, the city territory extends to the shore, where the south-western district of Ostia is located.

The altitude (height) of the central part of Rome ranges from 13 metres (43 ft) above sea level (at the base of the Pantheon) to 139 metres (456 ft) above sea level (the peak of Monte Mario). The *Comune* of Rome covers an overall area of about 1,285 square kilometres (496 sq mi), including many green areas.

Climate

Rome enjoys a Mediterranean climate (Köppen climate classification: Csa), with mild, humid winters and warm, dry summers.

Its average annual temperature is above 20 °C (68 °F) during the day and 10 °C (50 °F) at night. In the coldest month - January, the average temperature is 12 °C (54 °F) during the day and 3 °C (37 °F) at night. In the warmest months - July and August, the average temperature is 30 °C (86 °F) during the day and 18 °C (64 °F) at night.

December, January and February are the coldest months, with average temperatures around 12.5 $^{\circ}$ C (54.5 $^{\circ}$ F) during the day and 3.6 $^{\circ}$ C (38.5 $^{\circ}$ F) at night.

- 6. The St. Pietro (St. Peter's Basillica) currently displays the chains that supposedly held St. Peter while imprisoned (with St. Paul) in the Carcere Mamertino (Mamertine Prison) which can be seen if you get on the Christianity in the Ancient Rome tour.
- 7. According to the City of Rome, nearly 700,000 euros worth of coins gets tossed into the Trevi Fountain each year. The proceeds are donated to Caritas to help the needy. Visiting the Trevi Fountain is part of the Highlights of Rome Tour. Definitely one of our favourite facts about Rome.
- 8. Rome has a museum dedicated entirely to pasta. You get to taste some real Roman pasta on the Rome Sightseeing and Food Tasting tour.
