Hadrian's Men - Show Captures Hearts of the People!

On Friday 5th June 2016, I was invited to watch the new performance 'Hadrian's Men' by The History Team, the world-famous group that re-enacts important times in history. The group had been booked to perform at Hadrian's Wall since 2010 in a oneoff performance that will show the public just what it was like to live in Roman Britain. The tickets were sold out within hours back in 2010 with the audience coming from all parts of the globe including Japan and Canada.

The performance is all about a key person, Cassian, a Roman soldier whose job it was to patrol the wall. Cassian is played by Scott Pearson and this is his first acting role. With views across Northumberland behind us, we sat looking at the famous Hadrian's Wall as the opening scene shows Cassian going about his daily work. We are introduced to a range of characters: some Roman and others Barbarians. The key scene in the play is the battle between the soldiers on the wall where the Barbarians try hard to take the wall down. You see much sword fighting going on and as we know from history, the Roman soldiers of course win the battle, with many of the Barbarians being killed.

The show lasted around one hour with a break in the middle lasting twenty minutes. There were a range of actors cast for the performance, of all ages, and the costumes looked just like those we have seen in the museums. There were important artefacts used in the show and even animals to really make it feel real. There were soldiers on horses as well as farm animals used in the market scenes.

Scott Pearson, who played Cassian, was outstanding throughout. His performance drew the audience in and really made you feel you were part of the story. The audience were in tears at the sad scene where his wife dies but Scott was able to make people laugh out loud with some of the lines he said. His co-actor, Rupert Harrington, put on another great performance. Known for working in theatres, this was quite a change for him.

"This is very different to theatre. You don't have a flat stage to work with and rarely do you have real animals on stage. I loved doing this performance and I'm planning to do more re-enactment work in the future," said Rupert.

The set could not have been better. The actors were actually performing next to Hadrian's Wall in a section that the actors could walk around. There was drumming during the marching of the army which made you really feel you were part of it all. The costumes, I felt were a key part of the performance. With little details that showed the ranks of the soldiers, the costumes have been well thought out and well made. With the performance being outside and open to the weather, the actors had layers and layers of clothes to wear to make sure they were not cold waiting for their lines.

The National Arts Club have given The History Team a grant of money (around £250,000) to perform this play across the UK. It will be performed at museums and in schools in order for children to learn about Roman Britain and how important Hadrian's Wall has been to our history.

Manager of the Housesteads Roman Fort, Michael Wittlemore was there to watch the performance. "Wow, it really was history brought to life. We were thrilled to find out that we would be hosting the performance here near Housesteads and I was grateful to be invited to watch. It was great to see young people in the audience too — it is important to teach them why the Romans are key to our history," said Michael.

Overall, this was a real treat to see. The evening was incredible and I felt the plot behind the play was true to life. The small section of wall was transformed for an evening and the audience were taken back in time for an hour. I do hope that the actors get the chance to perform this play again.
