Who was Rosa Parks?

Rosa parks was born on 4th February 1913. Her mum was a teacher while her dad was a carpenter. Rosa lived on the farm with her dear grandparents and grew up there. Rosa Parks lived when life was hard for black people. They each had to go their separate ways they had to go to separate restaurants, public toilets, schools and churches but Rosa did not like it that way.

One day, after a busy day at work, Rosa went on a busy bus but she sat in a white person's seat and a white person came on the bus and told Rosa to move but guess what... she said `no'. The bus driver called the police and she was arrested.

After she was arrested, other black people wanted to help so they stopped using buses and the bus drivers started to lose lots of money. The bus drivers complained to the government and the government had to change the law. Rosa began to work for the Civil Rights Movement. While she was alive she saw lots of changes for the better.

Rosa Parks is the first civil right women. Sadly, she died on 24th October 2005 over 30,000 people came to her funeral! She is still remembered today for the part she played in promoting equality.
